Class of 2023

The Class of 2023 has achieved outstanding final results. In another eventful year, our students have shown dedication and resilience to generate wonderful outcomes that will now open those doors to their chosen fields of further study and work.

School Dux & Proxime Accessit

Congratulations to our School Dux, Tamsin Savery, who achieved an ATAR of 99.90, and to our Proxime Accessit, Emmanuel Sunartio who achieved an ATAR of 99.70.

Results in a snapshot:

- 32 students were awarded a total of 49 Merits, including 22 students earning 28 SACE Merits across 10 subject areas, and 15 students being awarded 21 Merit Equivalents across 17 University subjects.
- An impressive 7% of our Year 12 cohort placed in the top 1% nationally, with an ATAR above 99, with 31% of our students ranked in the top 5% nationally, with an ATAR above 95.
- 47% of our cohort join our Top Guns, a unique group reserved for students who achieve an ATAR above 90, placing them in the top 10% nationally.
- 61% of all grades achieved were A grades, compared to a State average of 32%, and a special mention to our International Students, who achieved impressive results once again.

These exceptional results occur because our talented students have talented teachers, who year after year, go above and beyond in their support, guidance, and care. Our teaching staff are delighted with the results and we salute their dedication, talent and 'do-whatever-ittakes' approach to help our students generate their best efforts.


Circle of Care Approach

The entire St John's Grammar Community is very proud of every member of the Class of 2023. We wish them all the best in the next stage of their journeys.



As our Junior School students rotated through a number of activity stations, our Year 8s relished the opportunity to have a hand in all parts of the event, right from concept, through to organisation and then facilitation on the day. The Year 8s first set their learning and success criteria, before seeking solutions and devising new concepts to deliver a Fair that showcased culture in an engaging and age-appropriate way, and also allowed our Year 8s to be graded for their efforts. In its fifth year, the Language Fair was a great success, not only due to the fun of the day, but also because it provided another unique avenue for student agency.





WILD WELCOME

We were delighted to welcome our newest International Students to our re-opened Boarding facilities earlier in 2023. A visit to Gorge Wildlife Park was a fun way to welcome our students with an up close and personal experience with some of our cute and cuddly wildlife, before surveying Adelaide from a different perspective at the Mount Lofty Lookout.

Culture and camaraderie were the order of the day, as our Year 7s threw themselves into a variety of sports and challenges originating from Indonesia, China and Japan for Asian Sports Day. This high-energy session devised by our Languages team, saw students learn about cultures in a hands-on way.













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SHARING IS CARING

A whirlwind global tour was made possible in a lunch time at our Culture Sharing Day. With Asia in the spotlight, students were able to 'visit' Japan, Vietnam, China, Korea and Indonesia by savouring tasty treats, playing games and engaging in fun challenges. The green tea ice cream stall was a particular hit, and 'bush tucker' also featured among a broad menu of tasty treats. We were even fortunate enough to have the students visiting from our Japanese sister school, Yasufuruichi High School, sharing with us their beautiful calligraphy and origami skills. What a treat to have a worldwide adventure without even leaving the school grounds!

VIETNAM VOYAGING

After being placed on hold during international travel restrictions, in 2023 our Year 9 students were once again able to resume 'The Journey' to Vietnam.

'The Journey' is a two-week long trip to Vietnam; an experience designed to engage our student travellers in meaningful service and to broaden their cultural understanding. Students took in a variety of destinations, including Ho Chi Minh City, the Mekong Delta, Hoi An, Hanoi and Sapa.

This trip is specifically tailored for young, inquiring minds and gives students the opportunity to explore Vietnam and also engage with the people and contribute to communities. The trip takes in many sights of Vietnam from one end to the other. Students explored guerrilla tunnels of Cu Chi, took part in an Amazing Race style activity, and a hands-on cooking class, all while developing a greater understanding of Vietnam's history and the development issues it has faced in the past and today.

Community service was a vital part of this trip, with students working alongside a remote community in a challenging house building project. A visit to the Thien Phuoc orphanage, which is run by the Sisters of Mercy, gave students the opportunity to consider life for these children and to be able to give back through volunteering their time.

All kinds of accommodation was experienced, from homestay in villages and along the Mekong River, through to overnight trains and hotels.



Part of the requirement for each student is to raise funds towards St John's Grammar's partner charities in Vietnam, including: KOTO (a hospitality training centre for disadvantaged street children), Thien Phuoc Orphanage, and towards the students' house building project for families in the Mekong Delta.

Not long after arriving in Adelaide, our new friends were honoured at a special welcome ceremony in our Language Centre Gardens. It was exciting watching friendships blossom



as we planted two cherry blossom trees in the garden to symbolise this special sister school relationship. To follow, our Yasufuruichi guests enjoyed some South Aussie 'tucker' including lamingtons, pies, Minties, Tim-Tams, and a variety of Kirks soft-drinks.

With the support of our families and the wider St John's Grammar community, we hosted our Japanese guests; a great cultural learning experience for all!

This experience was reciprocated later in the year when our own Japanese Language students travelled to Japan. How reassuring it must have felt to see a cohort of friendly faces welcoming them to Japan.

Visiting Japan

After a 5-year hiatus, 23 students from Year 10 and 11 who studied Japanese visited our sister school, Yasufuruichi High School in Hiroshima, Japan. Following Yasufuruichi's visit to us in July, we were delighted to now be the guests, and were warmly welcomed by the families. Our students experienced new food, new people, new culture and a new lifestyle, they were completely taken out of their comfort zone and stepped up to the challenge amazingly. Although, it helped that they were treated like celebrities at school!

Their Japanese language became authentic and confident as they bonded with students in their home group, classes and club activities. They experienced Kendo, traditional cooking, a tea ceremony, calligraphy, general classes and visited the local Junior School. There were a few tears upon leaving their new friends, but pledges were made to stay in touch for another visit to Japan some time in the future!

Our student group then embarked on a cultural exploration visiting Himeji, Kyoto, Nara and Tokyo. They climbed to the top of mountains, met wild deer, visited shrines, temples, towers, hedgehog cafes, Tokyo Disneyland, ate all the local foods and lots of green tea ice cream from vending machines, took bullet trains, buses and local trains in rush hour, not to mention traversing the busiest intersection on earth!







INDO ADVENTURES

During the 2023 Term 3 holidays, 14 students spent 11 days furthering their Indonesian studies with a visit to Indonesia. There's nothing quite like realworld experience in the country they are studying!

For the first time, this overseas journey had a specific aim on top of the 'usual' international experience, visiting our new sister school, 'Man Insan Cendekia', located in the city of Gowa, on the island of Sulawesi.

Travelling via Jakarta and Makassar, the group arrived at the Islamic boarding school and was welcomed like royalty, with local students lining the streets and waving flags and signs. The instant friendships made led to an easy immersion into the culture, with an education in sports, games, and local school life.

With a few tears shed upon leaving (but many, new Instagram friends added!), the students then travelled to Sanur, Bali, to participate in activities such as Batik making in Ubud, taking in the sunset views of the Tanah Lot temple, learning the epic Hindu tale of the Ramayan at Garuda Wisnu Park, and witnessing enormous sculptures, as well as the breathtaking sights of the Uluwatu cliff temple.

Over June and July 2023, *The Educator* invited schools across Australia to participate in the publication's 5-Star Innovative Schools awards. Now in its ninth year, this report recognises the schools at the forefront of change and innovation. Entries were open to all educational professionals who believe their school is pioneering a new direction in education.

From teaching approaches, to learning spaces, and curriculum design, the report looks at schools reshaping the future of education. By the end of the judging process, the entries were narrowed down to 35 of the country's most forward-thinking schools, which make up The Educator's 5-Star Innovative Schools 2023 list.

Our naming as one of the most innovative schools on this prestigious list recognises our School's efforts to be at the forefront of change and innovation, pioneering a new direction in education. From our teaching approaches to learning spaces and curriculum design, we have been actively shaping the educational landscape of the future.

Two key drivers of our journey to embrace innovation are our *Innovative Agency Program* from ELC - Year 12 and our *Flightpath* program both of which nurture our budding enterprising culture.

AMARDED

INNOVATIVE AGENCY FRAMEWORK

St John's Grammar's Innovation Agency Program is a multidisciplinary student agency program designed to explicitly teach and transfer both agency and digital technology skills to solve realworld problems. Through this framework, our students are learning vital skills such as problemsolving, critical thinking, and collaboration. We believe that by equipping our students with these skills, we are preparing them to thrive in the future, where these skill sets will be in high demand.

A whole-school approach to embed innovative practices across all disciplines ensures our teachers actively integrate innovative teaching methods, technologies, and project-based learning opportunities into their lesson plans. By linking these practices to the St John's Innovative Agency Framework, we empower students to think critically, creatively, and entrepreneurially in every academic pursuit. Whether it's an innovative history project that incorporates multimedia elements or a Science experiment that encourages students to propose unique solutions to real-world problems, our students are constantly challenged to apply their knowledge and skills innovatively.

SIGNATURE EXPERIENCES

The Signature Experience program embeds unique initiatives at each year level to further build upon and explore ways to discover, generate and innovate. From the elective innovation competition 'Shark Tank' in Year 5 and MiSpace passion projects in Year 6, to the Business Enterprise Solutions Teams (BEST) in Year 7 helping local businesses innovate, or the Innov8 problem-solving competition in Year 8 - each of these Signature Experiences provide unique ways to double down on their budding skill sets and gain real-world and practical experience.

For some, an introduction to these programs and their skill-building capabilities is not enough; they want to take their ideas further. That is where our Flightpath program comes in to allow students to take their dreams to reality.



FLIGHTPATH

Through Flightpath, our students have the opportunity to refine, research, and promote their innovations with the guidance of real-world engineers, innovators, and industry experts. It provides that important link to industry to enable our students to take flight with their ideas. In partnership with New Venture Institute (NVI) at Flinders University, Green Technologies, and Lot 14, we created a groundbreaking industry link that has taken our students' learning to new heights.

During the pilot phase of Flightpath, our students gained rich insights and applied STEM experiences. They worked on key skills to promote innovation, engaging in the design thinking process, communicating their ideas through augmented reality and virtual reality, linking coding concepts to design, collaborating with real-world engineers and innovators for design and market validation, and even pitched their ideas to industry professionals.

This immersive experience has provided our students with invaluable real-world exposure and opportunities to apply their learning in practical and meaningful ways.

IMMERSIVE INNOVATION

Fostering innovation and cultivating a passion for problem solving is also nurtured through a range of programs and initiatives across our School.

This year, we saw our students excel in Robotics, develop world-changing concepts at our Festival of Ideas, challenge their brains at competitions such as Write A Book In A Day and Tournament of Minds - these, are just some of the opportunities, there's no shortage of avenues to champion big ideas, blend critical and creative thinking or cultivate change.

Over the page are just a handful of initiatives that fall within the innovation realm that our students have embraced.



These are some of the initiatives that demonstrate how we foster innovation and agency at St John's Grammar.



BATTLING BOTS AT VEX CHAMPIONSHIPS

One of the School's standout initiatives is our comprehensive Reception - Year 12 Robotics Program. This program provides students with extensive opportunities to develop their knowledge and understanding of robotics and programming to apply theoretical concepts to real-world challenges. Through hands-on activities, students learn to design, build, and program robots, honing their problem-solving, critical thinking, and collaboration skills.

In 2023, St John's Grammar School joined forces with Pedare Christian College to host the VEX Robotics Competition at the Tonsley Innovation District. More than 350 students attended from across the state, representing dozens of schools and making this the biggest event of its kind in SA (only pipped in size by the actual National Championships that this event led towards). In front of local businesses and leaders in the innovation arena, our senior team took out the top honours of 'Skills Champion', 'Tournament Champion', and the award with the most prestige, the 'Excellence Award'!

Then, in November, the VEX Australian National Championships was held. St John's Grammar had two championship teams, our senior team consisting of Karmen Tang, Peter Knight, Eric Gu and Aidan De Sousa, and our inaugural Junior School team of Thomas Cobiac, Archer Diment, Jackson Burford, Bryce Counsell, James Fox and Sam Williams.

From first dipping their toe into the competitive robotics arena in Term 3, our Junior School team held their own in the competition, despite being 'newbies'. An incredible feat given the size and calibre of this competition. The senior team also worked well in a highly competitive field and won the Judges Award which is highly regarded.

The criteria for the award are as follows:

- Team displays special attributes, exemplary effort, or perseverance at the event.
- Team overcomes an obstacle or challenge and achieves a goal or special accomplishment.
- Team interview demonstrates effective communication skills, teamwork, professionalism, and a student-centered ethos.

Some St John's Grammar students also volunteered at the event including Archie McDonald and Adelaide Beckwith (along with sibling, Marcus Beckwith). They helped to score and referee the main events.

We are proud to have secured St John's Grammar's position as a highly competitive school in the robotics field.







STEM DAY

STEM Day came alive at the Junior Campus during Science Week. Artificial Intelligence (AI) was a large focus, with students creating AI art, trying to 'beat the Al' in 20 questions, and delving into Space exploration innovations with NASA 'spin offs'. Students learnt about drones and applications of this technology from seed planting, farming and even surf life saving. Next, students were taught drone safety before flying their own drones. Programming VEX robots and completing a series of guided activities and challenge courses enabled students to practice their programing skills – something that has been recognised as a highly valuable future skill. Meanwhile VR headsets in the Science Lab saw students travel to far flung places, and Christmas cheer came early with an array of light up circuit creations designed by our Year 6s. What an opportunity for exploration!





TOURNAMENT OF MINDS

Three teams represented St John's Grammar at the State Final of the Tournament of Minds competition. The Junior School team won Honours, finishing in the top 15%, and the two Secondary School teams each won their events in The Arts and Social Science categories.

The wins for the Secondary teams saw them compete in the International Finals which were held in Melbourne in October.

At the International finals, despite fierce competition, our teams just missed making it to the top three in their categories. However they were awarded the only Tournament of Minds Spirit Award and they also won the CBD Game On Amazing Race challenge the day prior to the competition. We are so proud of their achievements and their stellar efforts as ambassadors for our school interstate. In the spirit of the event, our students benefitted greatly from this open-ended challenge and problem solving program. With an aim to develop diverse skills, enterprise, time management, and the discipline to work collaboratively within a challenging and competitive environment, we felt our students rose to the challenge and extended their horizons.



FESTIVAL OF IDEAS

Students went 'Soaring Together Into The Unknown' for the 2023 Festival of Ideas. In a showcase of entrepreneurial and innovative talents, a huge variety of stalls, exhibits, displays, performances, presentations and activities were brought to life by our students. Even some of our parents joined the event showcasing the creative and diverse thinking among our community. The event is designed to challenge students' thinking, to champion big ideas, and show the work required to bring an idea to life. The greatest part of the event was the cross-campus collaboration, whereby all ages of students were able to tinker, create, explore and share ideas - whether they be big or small. To round out the event, our Early Learning Centre students visited the Secondary Campus for their own mini-Festival. Due to the hot forecast on the actual Festival, our little Eagles were given their own special day to explore and marvel. Students watched in awe as all types of products were manufactured in our Design & Technology Precinct, before a nature break in our special garden. Wide-eyed wonder continued as students were guided by Middle School students in an exploration of the campus.

















FLORA

The newly renovated White Chapel Art Gallery came into blossom at the perfect time, breathing life into 'Flora', the 2023 Year 7 - 11 SALA Art Exhibition.

In August, our community gathered for the special opening event to view the students' work and explore their artistic approaches. We were humbled to have multiple generations of families, old scholars, proud staff, and discerning art enthusiasts from the wider community viewing and exploring our students' work.

Author, illustrator, and St John's Grammar School parent, Nicole Stewart, was our guest speaker for the evening, talking about the experience of creating her new book '*What's Out There?*', a discovery of extraordinary Australian natural and cultural history with a quirky twist.

The art on display included everything from paintings and photography through to etched poetry and projected displays. Despite the diversity of works, the common thread was the importance of things that 'sustain' the soul.



























ART SHOW AT THE CENTRE FOR CREATIVITY

MY FIRST SPEECH GIVES CHELSEA A WINNING VOICE

Congratulations to 2023 Year 12 graduate, Chelsea Adams for winning the Australian Parliament's '*My First Speech*' competition in the Year 12 category. This challenge asked students from across the country to imagine themselves as newly elected Members of Parliament giving their first (or 'maiden') speech to the House of Representatives. Limited to just 90 seconds, Chelsea chose to address awareness and advocacy for Postural Orthostatic Tachycardia Syndrome (POTS), a condition close to Chelsea's family. Her choice paid off, with Chelsea being invited to speak in Parliament House and attend a number of meetings. It was there that Chelsea met Prime Minister Albanese who took a selfie with Chelsea and her fellow competition representatives and posted about it on his own feed!

Chelsea was one of only six Year 12 students nationally who reached the finalist standard required by the judging panel (chaired by The Hon. Milton Dick MP, the current Speaker of the House of Representatives).

HISTORICAL BELL FINDS PROMINENT NEW HOME



WABIAD



After receiving their compulsory cues (a lemon, a coach, and the line of dialogue "Close your eyes and count to ten.") and assigned individual genres (the St John's Grammar team received Spy and Comedy), students had just 48 hours to write, shoot, edit, and submit a short film! The team - Riley Hinton, Dhruv Rao, Adam Gleadle, Sasha Babina, Tiana Chung, and Rebecca Hunt, as well as volunteer extras Lee Li and Alyssia Angilletta - worked tirelessly in their inaugural year in the competition. The students were creative, professional, and used the skills they have built over years of study to great effect. Their work was screened on one of the five screening nights at the Palace Eastend Cinemas, and out of the 63 successfully submitted films they were one of 13 teams that made it to the awards night. Screened to a sold out audience in the ExiMax cinema, they took away best Crew Award for Riley Hinton, Best Student Actor for Dhruv Rao, and Best School Film for St John's Grammar.



INTERNATIONAL YOUTH SILENT FILM FESTIVAL St John's Grammar has an established history of excellence at the International Youth Silent Film Festival, and 2023 was no exception. Students work with pieces composed by internationally renowned theatre organ composer Nathan Avakian, creating three minute long silent films. Open to young film makers under 21, entries are short listed and this vear two St John's Grammar entries were screened at the Capri Theatre in Goodwood. Sasha Babina and Zoe Logan won Best Cinematography and second place with their Wes Anderson-inspired film, The Picnic Thief. Back after their win in 2022, Riley Hinton and Dhruv Rao took out first place once again. For the second time in St John's Grammar School history, one of our alumni has been awarded the oldest (and possibly most prestigious) international graduate scholarship in the world - the Rhodes Scholarship!

Oliver Douglas (Class of 2018) will now join the esteemed list of Rhodes Scholar winners, which includes Nobel Prize recipients, global leaders including Prime Ministers and Presidents of numerous countries, acclaimed writers, scientists, philosophers, filmmakers, and many other luminaries in their fields (such as our first Rhodes Scholar winner, the Class of 2005's Josh Makepeace!).

Awarded on the basis of outstanding intellect, character, leadership, and commitment to service, the Scholarship supports students who demonstrate a strong propensity to emerge as 'leaders for the world's future' - a path we are very pleased to have had a role in shaping. Oliver is currently completing his fourth year of a Bachelor of Arts (Honours) majoring in history at the University of Adelaide. He has previously received the Lynda Tapp Prize and the John F. Kennedy Memorial Scholarship, among other academic prizes.

Established in 1903, the Rhodes Scholarship is a fully funded, full-time, postgraduate award that enables talented young people from around the world to study at the University of Oxford. Oliver intends to undertake a Master of Studies in History at Oxford, particularly examining the functioning of British democracy when it faced serious challenges during the nineteenth and twentieth centuries.

Following the Master of Studies, Oliver plans to explore British democracy and its challenges in greater depth through a doctorate in the Faculty of History. Congratulations Oliver, it's so wonderful to see you continue to soar high!
